

What are the Benefits of Class A Trails?

- Allow for the Town to Make Repairs and Improvements
- Help to Preserve Community Character
- Support Our Local Economy
- Good for the Environment
- Improve Public Safety

Existing Class VI Road Regulations & Policies

- Building permits are not guaranteed; apply to the Selectboard & reviewed by Planning Board, Police Dept. and Fire Chief
 - o "Waiver of Liability" required
 - Road improvements by applicant required
 - Subdivision on Class VI roads not allowed unless the road is brought up to Class V standards
- Towns regulate public uses of Class VI Roads & Class A Trails
- Access to private holdings cannot be denied on Class VI Roads & Class A Trails

Strafford Class VI Road Study 2021

- Currently 21 Class VI Roads that extend over 23.5 miles
- 189 parcels have frontage on Class VI Roads

OF THOSE 189 PARCELS

- 102 have a residence somewhere on the property
- · 60 also have frontage on a Class V or State Road
- 27 are permanently conserved
- · 68 only have frontage on Class VI Roads and are not conserved

Concerns About Building on Class VI Roads


- Ability to access residences for emergency vehicles
- · Special needs access for education must be to the door
- Blocked access for outdoor recreation or to other landowner's properties
- Loss of a key component of Strafford's rural community character
- Negative impacts to natural resources

Why Designate Class A Trails?

- This is about protecting Strafford's natural beauty.
 (That's why we live here.)
- Some Class VI roads are too steep, narrow or rugged to pass with normal vehicles, are used primarily for recreation now, and should be preserved for their natural character.
- The Planning Board has identified sections of these that will provide the best benefit to all of us and limits the impact to abutting landowners.

2022 Warrant Articles Propose 5 New Class A Trails

- 1st Crown Pt. Rd Near the Barnstead Town Line
- 2nd Crown Pt. Rd Barn Door Gap
- Snackerty Rd Entire Length
- Willey Pond Rd Near Beam Camp
- Pig Lane Steep Slopes and 3 Streams



2nd Crown Pt. Rd - Barn Door Gap from the SW corner of 14-11-2 to the SE corner of 18-32 (approx. 3,600 ft.)






